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FROM THE OFFICE OF THE FIRST SELECTMAN

Dear Fellow Townspeople,

As the Holiday Season approaches, Kathleen and I wish you a safe and joyful time at your many holiday activities. Let's look at what has been going on in town.

Municipal Elections

It is an honor to be elected to serve as your First Selectman for another term. I want to thank all of our residents who ran for the many Boards and Commissions in our Town. Your willingness to serve our Town makes all of you winners in my book.

State Budget

After many stressful months, the State of Connecticut has adopted a biennial budget. The State has reduced funding to our Town for both the current Fiscal Year, as well as next Fiscal Year. We are fortunate that the reductions are less than originally planned; however, if the State's Projected Revenues decrease, we will be looking at more reductions to our municipalities. With that in mind, all Boards and Commissions will be reviewing their budgets for further efficiencies and cost savings in the current year, as well as very prudent budget requests for next Fiscal Year.

Route 85 Safety Upgrades

The Route 85 Safety Upgrades by the Skyline curve have been finished. This is a significant safety improvement. In the past few

years, there has been one death and several critical accidents in this area. Needed safety improvements included: significant drainage upgrades to keep the water and ice off of the travel lanes, wider shoulders to the road in each direction, increasing sightlines from a mere 200 feet to more than 550 feet, as well as correcting the pitch of the road bed. Thank you for your patience during this important safety improvement in our Town.

RESIDENT TROOPERS RECEIVE ZOLL DEFIBRILLATORS

In November, our Resident Troopers, Chris Pariseau and Luke Larue, received ZOLL Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs)

from the Gardner Lake Volunteer Fire Company. The Resident Troopers, with permission from their State Police Command, will carry the ZOLL Defibrillator in their issued cruisers.

"This is a valuable resource to the Town of Salem and the Heart Saver Program. Troopers who are trained as First Responders at the Emergency Medical Responder Level will have a quicker response to an injured party. Each Resident Trooper monitors a pager that activates when the Fire Company personnel are dispatched to an emergency.

Gardner Lake Volunteer Fire Company Fire Officers Sponsor and Participate in Two Leadership Training Events.

The Gardner Lake Volunteer Fire Company located in Salem, CT, has at least 25 active members serving the Town of Salem and surrounding communities with fire suppression, water supply, heavy rescue, and ambulance services. Among the active members are four chief fire officers who possess numerous national and state level certifications. The most interesting statistic for these four senior leaders is that they possess a combined 163 years of experience. On average, that is more than 40 years of experience apiece. Still, with all of this experience and education behind them, they are renewing their devotion to serve others the best they can by participating in senior executive level training with their fellow and future chief level officers from Southeastern Connecticut.

There are standards to meet that require this training. The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) requires a fire department to provide training and education commensurate with expected duties and functions. It further requires leaders and training instructors be provided with training and education which is more comprehensive than that provided to the general membership. After delivering the second officer training seminar this is now more than just meeting a standard.

On October 18, 2017, the Gardner Lake Volunteer Fire Company sponsored its 2nd Senior Officer Training Seminar. This seminar capitalized on the success of the first by focusing on a higher level of leadership. Its title: *Leading Change: It's Not Just Numbers*, pointed towards today's challenging leadership environment. In attendance were 20 fire/ EMS leaders and future leaders representing departments from: Salem, Oakdale, Chesterfield, Noank, and Eastern Region Incident Management Team #4. The seminar used a panel format to discuss personal leadership style and what to do and not do as a senior leader driving organizational change. Each panel member serves or served at the executive level of their respective organizations, all had overseas military experience, and three commanded units in combat situations in the Global War on Terrorism.

Dave Swinburne, a newly assigned Assistant Chief at the Oakdale Volunteer Fire Company, reflectively stated: "I absolutely loved sitting there last night listening to the passion they portrayed from personal experience...it makes such a difference when you care for yourself and others (by) continually practicing kindness and knowing it's not a weakness" as a senior leader.


The two seminars provided by the Gardner Lake Fire Company hit the mark, and moreover, provided advice to attendees that was unique in time and place. "Having executive level professionals share civilian best practices along with direct combat recollections to our members and fellow department members was to me priceless...asking questions and gaining insight from these accomplished panelists was truly extraordinary," said Joe Danao, an Assistant Chief with the Gardner Lake Volunteer Fire Company, who organized both senior officer training seminars.

The first seminar, held in June, was delivered by CDR (retired) Bill Moeller who provided extraordinary insight into leadership, creative thinking and networking through his experiences on a fateful day and since as a successful aerospace executive. CDR (retired) Moeller led the rescue team aboard the Coast Guard Cutter Tamaroa in a historic event now known as The Perfect Storm on October 30, 1991. He was an exceptional speaker and was gracious in volunteering his time to help area fire/EMS officers.

To prepare current and future fire service leaders for executive level positions is paramount to the success of a fire department in today's changing and challenging operating environment. It is not just meeting an OSHA standard or to get trained or to sit back and wait for operational success. To be effective today, a senior leader must be engaged and continuously learning about new concepts such as: values held by new team members, post-traumatic stress, evolving regulations, and constrained fiscal resources. What current senior leaders know of the past is at best a good baseline. This baseline is not enough; senior leaders must learn to recognize and act on changing patterns directly from subject matter experts from outside the fire/EMS services. Additionally, they must acquire this education alongside each other to form a common operating leadership picture. This training event's purpose was to provide current and relevant best practices from senior executives who are literally battle tested. We did indeed learn that leading change truly is not just about numbers.

A third Senior Officer Training event is planned for the March 2018 timeframe. The focus of this delivery will come directly from chief executives from the military and civilian organizations.

Winter Safety Messages from Your Friends at The Gardner Lake Volunteer Fire Company:

With the cooler temperatures expected, some may want to use their small space heaters. If so, DO NOT plug them into a power strip. These devices are not designed to handle the energy load of a space heater and can overheat, causing a fire hazard.

Power Outage: If you connect a generator to your house when the power goes out, please remember to abide by the following:

- Disconnect your power at the main breaker to the street. This will ensure that you are not back-feeding the power lines.
- Place your generator outside of your house and chain it to a tree. The exhaust can emit carbon monoxide gas, also known as The Silent Killer, into your house. This gas can cause head-aches and possibly death. Check your carbon monoxide (CO) detector batteries often to ensure that it is active. The detector should be replaced in accordance with the manufacturer's recommendation, generally every 5 to 10 years.
- Consult a Licensed Electrician on the wiring of your generator. All generators are different. Proper amperage, plugs and outlets may make a difference to your risk of a fire. Do not cut the end off of a plug and stick it into the generator as this will cause an electrical shock.
- When the snow builds up outside, please clean around all exterior vents associated with gas appliances, wood stoves and dryers. This will help eliminate CO buildup in your home.
- Assist first responders by clearing your walkways. Apply a pet safe non skid material to the surface. Please remember, pets are our friends too.

Fall has rushed in on us. Please come by to clear older decorations off plots that you own or maintain. The SGCA now allows for the placement of plastic/fabric flowers into April, 2018. Now that plot markers and meer stones are in place in the newly expanded section of Section IV, sales requests for plots in rows J, K and M can proceed.

Next up on our project list is the installation of a fence consisting of granite posts and chains (similar to that bordering town property and Route 85) delineating the boundary between the Cemetery and Church Parsonage property. We are targeting a December completion.

The SGCA is reviewing the current bylaws. Once the review is complete and any revisions are implemented, we will mail the updated bylaws to plot owners and post any portions that directly affect current plot owners on the board located near Section I.

Plot availability: As of 11/20/2017 all full sized plots in Section I have been purchased/deeded. Section IV has 274 full sized plots available for \$725 each. Regulations allow for one vault or a maximum of three (3) cremation containers per full sized plot. The cemetery receives only human remains – no animal remains are allowed.

Pastor Tim Dubeau is finishing out his ministry here in Salem on December 31, 2017. This leaves a vacancy in the Sexton position. This is a low intensity, easily manageable position for anyone who has some freedom in their schedule. It is not an hourly or salaried position although certain fees are payable to the Sexton for various functions. The Sexton's primary responsibilities are to oversee plot sales/fee collections and to mark out locations for grave openings and monument installation. If interested in learning more about this position, please contact Catherine Teel at 860-859-1142.

Questions regarding plot purchases, monument placement and/ or regulations may be directed to Catherine Teel after December 19, 2017 (Pastor Dubeau's last day serving as Sexton). The information board located near the first row of plots displays maps of the cemetery sections showing plot locations, interment/inurnment records by name/plot, plot pricing and contact information.

BOARD OF FINANCE

Since the last Board of Finance article in the Fall issue of *Our Town Salem* was released, a lot has changed in both our Connecticut and Salem budgets. What the Board of Finance previously thought was beginning to clear up, has once again gotten murky. First, let's discuss the State's budget; after failing to pass a budget by the July 1, 2017 deadline, Governor Malloy opted to run the State using his executive powers. Towns like Salem suffered greatly under that decision, especially in the area of Education Cost Sharing (ECS).

The Board of Finance went so far as to freeze Capital spending, and direct both the General Government and Board of Education to come up with plans for a Tier 1 and Tier 2 reduction of spending, depending on how deep the cuts would be in the final budget. When the bipartisan leadership of both the House and Senate got together and worked out a compromise, we thought we were in a pretty good place. The budget was passed by the members of both the House and Senate by a "veto-proof" margin, and was signed by Governor Malloy. The budget that passed had some changes (both positive and negative) for Salem, and for the State, in general. Salem's ECS funding, although still a decrease from the 2016-2017 level was a definite improvement over Governor Malloy's draconian budget.

The passed budget, which was signed into law by Governor Malloy in early November, did not raise income taxes or sales taxes but in part relies on some fairly ambitious revenue that the State is expecting in the future. In fact, The *New London Day* reported on November 14, 2017, that the State was already at least \$200 million behind its revenue goals. This has already resulted in a \$200 million deficit for this year and a \$300 million deficit for next year.

On November 17, 2017, the Governor (citing the \$200,000,000 shortfall in revenue), slashed the funds that Salem was slated to receive in the budget that was signed into law just two weeks earlier. Salem was slated to receive \$2,896,848 (a cut of \$150,000), the Governor's new cuts dropped ECS funding to \$2,654,289 (a cut of nearly \$400,000). The original budget had Salem losing approximately \$150,000 additional in funding in 2018-2019 over 2017-2018. But with the State deficit continuing to grow, it would be foolish to hazard a guess where funding will be next year. The new funding estimate looks like:

The State sent a letter to all municipalities on November 2, 2017, stating that they would try to get each town funded to where they should be by the end of November. Once that funding is in place, the Board of Finance will probably re-address the freeze on Capital spending. The current freeze is only in place until our December meeting.

It took Connecticut many years to get into the financial problems it is in, and it will not be fixed overnight. The General Government and the Board of Education need to continue to look at ways to do the work of the town and school in an efficient manner. The Board of Finance will continue to write articles for *Our Town Salem* to keep the public apprised of what is going on in a non-biased manner.

We have enjoyed a very successful beginning to the 2017-2018 school year at Salem School.
