### Used book sale rain or shine

The prospect of gale force winds and heavy rain did little to dampen the enthusiasm of patrons who were shopping the Used Book Sale.

The sale netted about \$5,900 and will account for a substantial portion of the money the Friends (FOSL) plan to donate to the Salem Library.

The money will be used for programs, passes, books, DVD's and the Summer Reading Program.

The two-day sale was supported by 98 volunteers, some who worked a few hours, and others who worked the entire day; a few took a day off from work to volunteer. Many tweens and teens, along with their parents, fulfilled their service hour requirement when the rain cancelled their outdoor games.

One cannot thank enough those volunteers who collect and sort the books. These tasks are performed nearly every day the library is open from June to the end of September.

The sorters organize the books into 75 categories making a big difference to our customers who repeatedly say, "Salem has one of the best

Used Book Sales in the State". A special thank you to the great support of Salem School and the Town's Public Works Department.

## Frequently asked question: Where do books go after the sale?

Every year, the leftover books go to different places. We usually donate some books to other nonprofits and this year we donated to the Salvation Army.

The remaining books were loaded on a semi-trailer and sent to Thrift Books in Baltimore, MD. FOSL has entered into a partnership with Thrift Books who sells used books online.

Chances are that if you have purchased a used book online, the book originated from the Thrift Books warehouse.

Thrift Books and FOSL split the shipping costs and if any of our books are sold, we will split the profit and generate some additional revenue for the library.



## Famous Tamil poet shops at Salem Friends used book sale

The acclaimed Tamil poet and critic, Alandur Mohana Rangan, was among the hundreds of customers at the Friends of the Salem Library Used Book Sale held during the last weekend in October. He purchased poetry and classic books without leaving India.

It just so happens that one of Mr. Mohana Rangan's friends, and a native of India, is Govar Kuruchi.

Mr. Kuruchi is a volunteer who helped sort the books this summer and worked at the Used Book Sale.

Knowing of Mr. Mohana Rangan's interest in poetry, Mr. Kuruchi used his smartphone to make a video of the books in the poetry section of the sale.

He sent the video to Mr. Mohana Rangan who reviewed the video and texted the titles of the poetry books he was interested in purchasing.

Mr. Kuruchi purchased the books and will deliver them to his friend on his next trip to India.

While technology made selecting the books efficient and inexpensive, long distance delivery can be costly, unless you have a friend with room in their suitcase.

The Salem Friends, plan to stick with on-site purchase and pick-up until the long distance delivery problem is solved.



## FOSL is Looking for a **Treasurer**

As we reported in the last issue, our treasurer, George Ziegra, is retiring in May 2019 and we are looking for a replacement. Over the years, the Friends have developed tried and true financial procedures that work well with the Friends and Library staff. All of these are important tasks that can be accomplished in a couple hours each week, on your own schedule, and at home. You will probably need to visit the library weekly.

In addition, each student must perform On the Job (OTJ) training by serving a 12-hour shift with AETNA or ASM Ambulance in Manchester and/or Hartford, Connecticut. The Bridge Class is the next step for our dedicated EMR's to EMT. Class will be complete by Christmas 2018.

**Firefighter Training:** Members have enrolled in Core Rescue, Pump Operator and Firefighter 2 Training. The many hours for this training is indicative of their drive to learn and serve our community.


Emergency Medical Services (EMS) training is held each month as an In-service Training. Collectively, with the Salem Volunteer Fire Company, we have been conducting this training since 1991. In October, we hosted the State of Connecticut Medical Examiner's Office with "Anatomy of an Overdose." This seminar was instrumental in recognizing and iden-

tifying the scene of an overdose. No town is immune, including ours. This class opens our eyes and allows us to understand what happens within the family and the opioid dependent person.

Our Future: Members have enrolled in the State of Connecticut, Commission of Fire Prevention and Control (Fire Academy), Fire Service Instructor 1 Program in January. This program will take the Firefighter 2 to the next level of responsibility and certification. This will also allow our Firefighters to teach and convey their skills and training to our future members. In April, the Gardner Lake Volunteer Fire Company will host the Fire Academy's Fire Officer 1 Class. As our members grow from the Fire Instructor 1 Class, this is the next step into the leadership roles of the Company. We thank our community and the Town of Salem Leadership, Board of Selectmen and Board of Finance for allowing us to provide this training and build on the future of Our Town of Salem.

The Uncas Health District's mission is "to promote and protect the public's health in order to prevent illness, death and disability among its residents." This work could not be done without our community partners.

On many occasions, we refer residents to *Thames Valley Council* for Community Action, Inc. (TVCCA) for heating assistance, Meals on Wheels, childcare or other community services utilizing their "no wrong door" approach. Residents needing healthcare, whether they be insured, underinsured or uninsured are referred to United Community and Family Services (UCFS) where they will find a patient-centered medical home. Community benefits through Backus Hospital can prevent a patient from unnecessary and costly use of the emergency room or hospital. Senior Resources Agency on Aging provides information and services to the aging population, individuals with disabilities, their families and care providers to maintain or improve their independence and quality of life. Madonna Place provides services which strengthen families, promote health, and prevent child abuse and neglect.

These are just a few examples of our dependence on many agencies and municipal partners to close the gaps in the community. We realize the needs of residents can be incredibly complex. Often, knowing who to call is the first step in giving help.

## Reminder for the upcoming winter season for prevention of chimney fires

According to the latest statistics available, there are over 25,000 chimney fires per year in the U.S. that are responsible for over \$125 million in property damage. These sobering statistics relate to several deaths and injuries when these chimney fires spread into house fires. The dangers of chimney fires also caught the attention of one of the United States' Founding Fathers, inventor Benjamin Franklin, who in 1742 invented the Pennsylvania Fireplace which later became the Franklin Stove. He did this because he recognized the dangers of chimney fires in his time.

## How often should your chimney be cleaned?

The Chimney Safety Institute of America (CSIA) recommends that chimneys should be cleaned when there is approximately 1/8" of creosote or soot buildup.

There isn't a simple rule of thumb on how often to clean your chimney, such as cleaning after 50 uses or once a year. The problem is, creosote can form when wood is burned incompletely. A smoky fire without enough oxygen emits lots of unburned tar vapors that can condense inside the fireplace flue and stick to it, possibly leading to a chimney fire. You can reduce creosote buildup

in your fireplace flue by providing adequate combustion air, which will encourage a hot, cleanburning fire. To check for creosote yourself, first make sure there's no downdraft from the chimney. If you feel an airflow, open a door or window on the same floor as the fireplace until the downdraft stops or reverses and air flows up (tape tissue to the fireplace opening and watch its movement). Then, while wearing goggles and a basic disposable dust mask, take a strong flashlight and your fireplace poker and scratch the black surface above the damper (smoke chamber). If the groove you scratch in the creosote is paper thin, no cleaning is needed. If it's 1/8 inches thick, schedule a cleaning soon. If you have 1/4 inches of creosote, do not use the fireplace again until it is cleaned — a chimney fire could occur at any time.

## How does a homeowner know if there is 1/8" of built-up soot in their chimney?


It is very difficult for a homeowner to know if there is built-up soot in their chimney. A professional chimney sweep technician can examine the chimney and determine if the chimney should be cleaned. The chimney sweep technician will also be able to examine the chimney liner for any cracks or damages. This is important as the repairs can be done at the same time the chimney liner is cleaned. A chimney should be cleaned at least once a year by


a trained professional. The best time of year to have your chimney cleaned is summer or before fall begins. This will have your chimney cleaned, maintained and repaired before the heating season begins. A homeowner should never neglect having the chimney cleaned. Removing creosote, soot and debris from the chimney will keep your chimney safe and performing properly.

## How do you know if you are experiencing a chimney fire?

Chimney fires begin with snaps and pops as loud as gunshots, eventually turning into a deep, rumbling sound like a train. Oily, black flaming creosote rains down into the firebox. When the fire starts, it's like an explosion. Flames blast out of the top of the chimney and back down into the firebox. Due to thermal expansion, the chimney liner may crack at an unreachable mid-point and shoot flames into the walls from the inside. This may spread further into the walls causing a house fire. Chimney fires typically cannot be controlled by the homeowner. What should you do? Evacuate the house and call 911. Trained firefighters with special equipment will be needed to extinguish the fire and check for potential fire expansion into the walls.

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## SALEM LAND TRUST

The Salem Land Trust (SLT) was busy in 2018 acquiring new lands to add to our existing Preserves — and, the biggest news is that SLT is working to acquire the land for an all new 255-acre Preserve in 2019! Full information on that news below.

But first, those Medallions! Did you have fun searching for the beautiful hand-crafted medallions hidden along the public trails in Town during "Walktober?" Many were hidden on Salem Land Trust properties, and this writer and other land trust members had a blast hiding them! Thank you to the Salem Recreation Commission, Chairperson Teri Natoli, and The Red House for making it all possible.

This past August, the SLT Board gratefully accepted The Nature Conservancy's [TNC] offer to transfer ownership of their 33.5-acre Winslow Preserve to the Salem Land Trust; this parcel is now part of SLT's Darling Road Preserve. This Preserve is right on the Salem-East Haddam town line, borders the Eightmile River, and now has grown to 142.6 acres! If you have never walked this Preserve it is the perfect walk in the woods. Sarah Pellegrino from TNC said, "Winslow Preserve is a wonderful place, and the Salem Land Trust is a great organization with which The Nature Conservancy has a strong relationship. This is an excellent fit, and we know Winslow Preserve is going to be in good hands." With the addition of these 33.5 acres from TNC, there are now three entrances and three parking areas for the Darling Road Preserve. Please check the SLT web site, www.salemlandtrust.org, for the DRP trail map, and for all the trail maps of our Preserves. Maps are also posted at each parking area.

Recently, a generous donor gave SLT land for a new 5-acre Preserve, also on Darling Road. This parcel is just west of the intersection of Darling Road and the west end of White Birch Road. What is special about this property is that there are short trails leading from the road to the banks of the Eightmile River. This Preserve does not yet have a name and our signs are not up, but it will be marked soon. People walking, running or biking along Darling Road will want to stop at this preserve to visit a quiet place

by the river.

Once again Eagle Scouts and Boy Scouts have helped the Salem Land Trust blaze and mark new trails, this year on the Zemko Sawmill Preserve on Rattlesnake Ledge Road. In addition to a new White Trail at the rear of the Preserve, the Scouts were responsible for clearing and marking a whole new trail system on the 20-acre expansion parcel to the east of Whittlesley Swamp. This beautiful swamp is across the road from the entrance to the Salem Transfer Station. Thank you to all the Scouts and their parents who spent weekends making these new trails for all of Salem to enjoy!

## For 2019, The Salem Land Trust is embarking on its most ambitious project ever!

We have the opportunity to acquire 255-acres, partly through donation and the rest at a bargain sale, on West Road. These acres are some of the most beautiful and natural resources in the region. Crossed by old logging roads, this new Preserve will be suitable for hiking, biking or horseback riding, and offers access to water features and scenic views. All within the Eight Mile River Watershed and Audubon's "Lyme Important Bird Area," these lands are home to Cerulean and Worm-eating Warblers, Pileated Woodpeckers, Wood Thrushes, Scarlet Tanagers, Saw Whet Owls and at least 192 additional bird species. Gray Fox, White-tailed Deer, Coyote, Bobcat and Fisher cats are just some of the animals found there.

How you can help! SLT has already secured two large and one small grant toward the purchase, and is awaiting to hear from other granting organizations. These grants





cover about 85% of the project cost. However, we still need to raise additional funds from private donations. Our public appeal has just begun. If you would like to contribute toward this new Preserve and increase public recreation opportunities in Salem, you may send donations to: Salem Land Trust, P.O. Box 2133, Salem, CT 06420!

The Salem Land Trust is an all-volunteer, private 501(c)(3) non-profit; we are not part of your town government. We own 370 acres of permanently conserved land in Salem, and manage the 400-acre Walden Preserve, owned by The Nature Conservancy. Some of our land was donated to SLT by private landowners; other acreage was purchased with private individual donations, grants from state and federal agencies and grants from private foundations.

Use of the marked hiking trails on our land is always free and open to the public, dawn to dusk, every day of the year. Volunteers do all the work maintaining the trails and volunteers administer the organization. We are always looking for committed people to act as stewards for the properties, help with trail maintenance, serve on one of our Committees or on the SLT Board of Directors.

## Plot availability

As of November 30, 2018 there are only plots available in the cremation area of Section I priced at \$350, that allows 2 cremations per plot.

Section IV has 262 full-sized plots available for \$725 each, these allow for one full-vault burial or a maximum of three (3) cremation containers.

The cemetery receives only human remains - no animal remains are allowed.

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
