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

Opioid Overdoses

By now, most people have heard about the opioid epidemic in our country. In the State of Connecticut, opiates contributed to 90% of unintentional drug overdose deaths in 2015-2016. Heroin and Fentanyl were among the most common opiates involved, contributing to 53% and 41% of unintentional drug overdose deaths, respectively. The Office of the Connecticut Chief Medical Examiner's Office has seen a 65% increase in autopsies since 2012 because of law enforcement requests due to heroin overdoses. In fact, Connecticut residents are now more likely to die from unintentional drug overdose than a motor vehicle accident.

There are common risk factors for opioid overdoses. Mixing opioids with other drugs, particularly alcohol or sedatives can lead to an overdose. Some overdose when they resume the use of opioids after a period of abstinence, such as recent release from a rehabilitation center or from incarceration. Emergency Medical Technicians tell us that elderly people may forget that they already took their medication and accidentally re-take the same medication. Finally, younger age individuals, specifically those in their teens or early 20s can be exposed to peer pressure or a social environment where drug use is prevalent.

Signs of an overdose include a face that is extremely pale and/ or clammy to the touch, a body is limp, fingernails or lips with a blue or purple cast, and vomiting or making gurgling noises. Individuals that overdose cannot be awakened from sleep or are unable to speak, and their heartbeat and breathing are very slow or stopped.

While we hope it will never happen, there are things you can do if you see someone overdose. First, call 911 immediately. Next, you should support the person's breathing. If you have naloxone (Narcan), please administer it. Lay the person on their side once they have resumed breathing and stay with the overdosed person until the ambulance arrives.

Finally, you can take steps to prevent an overdose before it happens. You can take your unused prescription drugs to one of the many local collection boxes. A list is available at http://www.ct.gov/dcp/cwp/view.asp?q=501922 You may support elderly residents by sorting daily medications in advance. Finally, you can have an honest discussion with young people to educate them on the risks of drug use and abuse.







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SALEM CEMETERY

In May 2017, Association members cleared the cemetery of unsightly holiday decorations, spent plantings, abandoned pots and tattered flags. Now that summer is upon us please be certain to limit your plot decorations to the area specified in our bylaws. This is necessary in order to ease the work of those town employees who mow and trim. We cannot ensure that decorations outside of the prescribed limits will be safe from damage. Also, please note that any plant varieties seen to overwhelm the monuments they decorate will be removed at the discretion of the Sexton. Plastic or artificial flowers are prohibited from April 15 through November. All plot owners have a role in maintaining the beauty of our cemetery by keeping their own plots clean and neat.

Though we have two water sources (pitcher pump and garden hydrant), we recommend the use of the garden hydrant located behind the Salem Historic Society building. The pitcher pump tends to lose its prime making the pumping of water difficult.

The construction of a new roadway has begun. This will allow access to an additional 180 plots in Section IV of the cemetery. A fence consisting of granite posts and chains (similar to that bordering town property and Route 85) is planned to delineate Cemetery from Church property.



Plot availability: As of 05/22/2017 there is one (1) full sized plot remaining in Section I priced at \$550. Section IV has 96 full sized plots available for \$725 each. Regulations allow for one vault or a maximum of three (3) cremation containers per full sized plot. The cemetery receives only human remains – no animal remains are allowed.

Contact the SGCA Sexton, Rev. Tim Dubeau at 860-705-1925 with questions or if interested in purchasing full sized or smaller cremation plots. The information board located near the first row of plots displays maps of the cemetery sections showing plot locations, interment/inurnment records by name/plot, plot pricing and contact information.

Lastly, the SGCA is seeking to train another sexton. Any person interested in receiving training is encouraged to contact Rev. Tim Dubeau at 860-859-1925, 860-705-1925 or at tbdubeau@sbcglobal.net. This is a volunteer position well suited for a person who has a flexible daytime schedule.

SALEM SCHOOL NEWS

Our goal at Salem School is to foster a collaborative, innovative, technologyrich, student-centered learning environment complemented by varied instructional methodologies to meet the needs of our learners. Student voice and problem-solving through safe and healthy choices work in partnership with our academic expectations to inspire our students to be the best they can be, not only in thought, but in action as model citizens of our school. These 21st Century learning skills have served as the foundation for our teaching and learning community as we teach the necessary knowledge and skills to ensure our students are prepared for the world we live in.

As the school year comes to an end, I am very proud to share some of our students' accomplishments and experiences that have transpired during this latter part of the 2016-2017 school year.

Life at Salem School Environmental Classroom

In May, the third graders from Salem joined the third graders from East Lyme to take part in the Outdoor Stormwater Classroom in Niantic. This is an outdoor environmental classroom that showcases many of the technologies and techniques utilized to treat and reduce storm water runoff. Students participated in presentations such as: a Master Gardener, Recycling, Shoreline Species and Habitat, and Enviroscape models. We would like to thank the organizations that have made this experience possible: East Lyme Town and Engineering, the Public Works Departments, the CT DEEP Marine Fisheries Division, CT DEEP Bureau of Watershed Protection and Land Reuse, Save the River-Save the Hills, Inc., The Niantic

River Watershed Commission, and Southern Connecticut Regional Resources Recovery Authority for the Recycling program.

Citizenship

Our sixth grade students created informational books focused on kids around the world working to make their community a better place. Sixth grade continued with this theme through a service project to benefit the students at the Ramses College for Girls in Cairo, Egypt. Throughout these units of study, many good citizenship qualities have been displayed by students. We are looking forward to seeing how they will stay 'active' and continue to positively influence their community. In math, students were 'actively' learning all about statistics.

Technology

Technology classes have been beyond busy! Kindergarten classes have been enhancing their literacy skills while navigating and problem solving in various reading sites. First grade is finishing a dinosaur research project ending with creating talking dinosaur pictures. The second grade just finished an animated book titled "A is for Second Grade." Third and fourth grade continue with Power Point and Word skills. Fifth grade dug deeper into Word, ending with a homemade Bingo review. Sixth grade has finished a bibliography unit and are now working on an art tech project in Sketchbook. They are turning their very own faces into cartoons. Seventh grade shared their Public Service Announcements that were created with videos or still pictures on IMovie. Finally, the Eighth grade shared their stop motion projects at the end of the school year. The Broadcast group continues to entertain the school every Friday with a morning news show. The broadcast

team went "live" for the first time in May!

Music

It's been a busy spring in the music department. The fifth-eighth grade students in the Theater Club finished a very successful three day run of *The Lion King*. A spring concert presented by the students in kindergarten and first grade called "Nuts!" was also presented in May. The theme was about some wild and crazy squirrels. The Pre-K class students also performed in May, not only for their parents, but also for the Salem Seniors who enjoyed a preview of some of their songs for the Senior Citizen luncheon on May 9.



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On May 24, the Salem Resident Troopers LaRue and Pariseau, working with the Salem Elementary School, presented the second "Safety Awareness Day."

The day would not have been possible without the help of State Police K-9 Handler TFC Cost, and of course K-9 Nikko; Hebron Resident Trooper Greenwood's DWI simulator; Trooper Dodge with the State Police motorcycle unit: State Police Detectives Wordell and Couco from the Major Crimes Division; State Police Sgt. Martines and Colchester K-9 handler, officer Grose, and of course K-9 Josie narcotics sniffing dog; DEEP Officer Wojcik; Salem and Gardner Lake Fire Department; and the Life Star Helicopter.

The day started with the grade school students initially watching the Life STAR helicopter landing on their soccer field. They then had a chance to see the medical helicopter up close and talk to the crew. The middle school students at the same time were in an assembly learning how to respond in various emergency situations.

All the students then went in groups to various stations to learn about the multitude of emergency services. The stations consisted of: learning about the State's K-9 program, learning about how the Major Crimes Division goes about solving a crime, learning about what the DEEP Animal Division provides, learning about the State Police's motorcycle unit, learning how K-9s are used to sniff out drugs, learning about the effects of driving under the influence; and, of course, learning about Salem and Gardner Lake Fire Departments.

In watching the day progress, not only did the students have fun and ask questions, but so did the teachers and volunteers of the event. The hit of the day, even with the rain, was the LifeStar Helicopter landing and taking off from the school.
