SNOW REMOVAL

Street safety is the Town of Salem Public Works Department's primary concern during the winter months. Public Works treats the pavement and removes snow whenever road conditions call for these services. Residents should remember that all snow removal operations are performed under emergency conditions. Our drivers work extended hours to ensure safe and effective snow removal. Please help the Public Works Department by following the Snow Emergency Tips and Reminders listed below:

- The Town of Salem has 44 road miles to maintain. Public Works is also responsible for clearing the Town Office, School, Town Library and Transfer Station.
- There are several State controlled roads in Town. Any road that has a route number is a State controlled road. (Routes 82, 85 and 354) The State of CT plows those roads. Please remember that Public Works is not responsible for removing the snow created by plowing past your driveway.
- Please move all vehicles off of the streets or cul-de-sacs during all snow storms that have the possibility of producing at least 3 inches of snow.

SNOW REMOVAL (continued)

- The Town of Salem is not responsible for the snow that accumulates around your mailbox. It is the homeowners' responsibility to remove the accumulated snow from their mailbox.
- Please place your garbage and recycling roll out containers beyond the edge of pavement or curb and NOT in the street. Objects in the street are the biggest deterrent to efficient plowing operations. Remove all basketball backboards from the Town right of way.
- Never pass a snowplow or salt truck.
- If you use a snow blower to clear your driveway, do not blow the snow into the street.
- Never assume the snowplow drivers can see you. Stay at least three (3) car lengths behind the truck. It you cannot see the driver in his mirrors then he cannot see you either.
- If you, or your contractor, use a snow plow to clear your driveway, do not push the snow into the road.

TOWN MAILBOX DAMAGE POLICY

In order to provide a fair and uniform resolution to incidents involving mailboxes damaged by a Town snowplow the Town of Salem adheres to the following policy concerning repair/replacement of mailboxes.

It is a job of the Public Works Department to remove snow from road surfaces. Snow being thrown by a plow can significantly impact the mailbox and cause damage. There is nothing that can be done to prevent snow from being thrown from the plow blade. Mailboxes must be securely fastened to a sturdy post in the ground to reduce or resist the impact of thrown snow.

The mailbox, post and arm should be at least (8") inches from the face of curb or edge of pavement in order to prevent direct contact by the snow.

If it is determined that a mailbox was struck directly by a Town snowplow, the Town will replace the existing mailbox and post with a standard mailbox and post. Custom mailboxes and posts will not be replaced in-kind.

No mailbox or post will be considered for replacement if the post shows dry rot, unstable or was placed too close into the travel way.

The Town will replace the mailbox and/or post only when the Town snowplow is found to have made direct contact with the mailbox, not when the box is knocked over by snow or slush that is thrown by the plow.

Basketball hoops and sprinkler systems within the town right of way are not permitted and will not be replaced, repaired or reimbursed by the town.

The Director of Public Works or a designated representative is authorized to use reasonable discretion in resolving matters involving unusual circumstances.

COLCHESTER SENIOR CENTER:

Status of the New Colchester Senior Center Building

- November 16, 2021-Colchester Citizens passed a referendum to build a new senior center as recommended by the Senior Center Building Committee and as designed by Silver, Petrucelli & Associates Architectural Firm in the amount of \$9.5 million by a majority vote of 1,421 yes to 851 no votes.
- December 21, 2021-State Representative Brian Smith announced that the State of CT Bonding Commission had awarded \$2.5 million toward the cost of building the new senior center project.

COLCHESTER SENIOR CENTER (continued)

Status of the New Colchester Senior Center Building (continued)

- October 3,2022-The Colchester Senior Center received the last of three installments of the Estate of Mr. Stephen J. Bendas, in a bequest totaling \$575,000.00.
- The project moved into the final design phase, the project's cost was estimated, and the project went out to bid following the standard competitive bidding process with the lowest qualified bid being eligible to be awarded the contract.
- October 13, 2022, the Senior Center Building Committee opened 11 bids with contractors for the new senior.
 Due to inflationary increases and historically high costs to build, a current reality, all 11 bids came in higher
 than what was expected, ranging in overall costs from over \$11 million to \$8,995,000. Because money for the
 design phases has already been expended, this leaves a budgetary shortfall of \$920,000 toward the project
 after alternate items deemed unnecessary by the Senior Center Building Committee have been pared from
 the project to reduce the overall cost.
- If the Bendas Bequest is allocated toward the cost of the project; a reasonable approach which does not increase the mil rate or pass on additional project costs to taxpayers, this reduces the budgetary shortfall to \$345,000.
- Some citizens are calling for the building to be redesigned to stay within the original \$9.5 million. Redesigning the building at this point renders the current plans obsolete and will cost the Colchester approximately \$400,000 in redesign fees. Once redesigned, the project will have to begin the bid process again, and face additional inflationary costs caused by the loss of the current lowest bid, and additional delays estimated to be an additional \$1.5-\$2 million. In essence, the redesign of the building, which will yield less space and fewer amenities and will cost the taxpayers potentially \$2.4 million more.
- Approximately 125 people attended the November 28th joint meeting of the Colchester Board of Finance and Board of Selectmen. As a way to update those that were not in attendance, First Selectman, Andreas Bisbikos, opened the meeting with an announcement that earlier that day two Colchester citizens, Taras Rudko and Selectman Jason LaChapelle had filed an injunction against the Town of Colchester and on the advice of legal counsel, all agenda items pertaining to the new senior center project would not be discussed.
- On December 15th Selectman Jason La Chapelle and Taras Rudko filed an additional emergency injunction
 which has been granted. It stipulates that the Colchester is not permitted to move towards awarding a
 contract until after the outcome of the scheduled hearing next Tuesday.
- At court hearing on December 28th, testimony heard all day. It was decided by the presiding Judge to resume proceedings December 29th at 10:00 AM.
- Testimony wrapped up on December 29th and both sides made their closing arguments. Counsel for the plaintiffs (LaChapelle/Rudko) asked the Honorable Karen Goodrow to review a 430+ page document prior to sharing her ruling, so the Judge decided to adjourn for the day. The Judge indicated that she will rule on the case on December 30th at 10:00AM.
- On December 30th the Judge denied the injunction against the new senior center project on all points cited in the complaint. Colchester can now move into the construction contract phase of and move the new senior center project forward with the apparent low bidder, before the current pricing expires.
- The Colchester BOS voted in in favor of awarding the construction bid to BRD Builders, LLC. This locks in the pricing of the low bid before the 90-day deadline, and allows the Town to begin the process of negotiating a contract with them. This was an important step forward in the new senior center building project.


