Teamwork - Salem Remains Fiscally Strong and Sound

Salem remains fiscally strong and sound. We have successfully passed yet another comprehensive town hall audit, revealing that our business practices are fiscally sound and our rainy-day fund is healthy and strong.



Salem School Second Graders Visit Town Hall

Each year, Salem School Second Grade students and their teachers spent time touring the Salem Town Hall and learn how Town Hall functions. The day culminates in a student run Town Meeting.

Town Clerk Linda Flugrad, Executive Assistant Alesha Brothers, and I gave a brief lesson on the workings of a Town Meeting.

The children took part in a lively town meeting by debating and voting for or against having to do homework on the weekends. As in years past, the children voted that they should have only a small amount of homework on the weekends.

Collaboration - Fire Marshal Regionalization

Thanks to the leadership and collaborative efforts of Salem Fire Marshal Tom Main, Salem is now sharing Fire Marshal services with neighboring towns. I recently signed a Regional Fire Marshal Regionalization agreement with the towns of Bozrah, Lebanon, Franklin, and Colchester on behalf of Salem. The new agreement allows us to partner and share scarce Fire Marshal services and personnel. It has become an increasing challenge to properly staff emergency services. Regionalization is a good way to bridge the gap in a fiscally responsible way.

Salem Public Safety Firsts - Fire Marshal

Salem Resident CT State Trooper Kevin Crosby and Salem Firefighter / EMT Travis Roberts recently became certified as Deputy Fire Marshals. They will maintain their primary duties and responsibilities, but the town will have additional flexibility and resources.

FF / EMT Roberts is the first full-time Salem Firefighter / EMT to hold the added certification of Deputy Fire Marshal. Trooper Crosby is the only Resident Trooper in the State of Connecticut to hold a certification as a Deputy Fire Marshal. Cross training staff is a good way to enhance town services in a fiscally responsible way.

TOWN CLERK UPDATE

Dear Fellow Townspeople,

As I write this, we are still enjoying the very warm days of summer.

As of this time, we have registered over 350 dogs. Just a reminder that all dogs 6 months of age or older must be registered. If you obtain your dog when they are older than 6 months, they must be registered within 30 days of them joining your family.

We are excited to report that our Historic Document Preservation Grant amount was increased to \$6,000 this year. We have contracted with Adkins Printing to recreate our oldest indices and some of our older land record books to make them more user-friendly. The majority of our records are available digitally and can be found online.

This November's municipal election season was busy with party endorsements and absentee ballots. Absentee ballots were available to registered voters who requested one from early October. SALEM VOLUNTEER FIRE CO. 80TH ANNIVERSARY





On July 23, 2023, the Salem Volunteer Fire Co., Inc. celebrated their 80th Anniversary at The Salem Herb Farm. Here are some of the highlights from the afternoon.

The Salem Volunteer Fire Company was established in 1943 by a group of Salem Townspeople who saw the need for a Town Fire Company. The Fire

Company, which was made up of mostly farmers, local businessmen and housewives, was incorporated in 1946 and became a 501(c)(3) in 1991.

The following is from the minutes of one of the first meetings:

"Mr. Donald Fraser introduced Mr. Thomas Martin who told the meeting something of the organizing of volunteer fire companies in Waterford, Cohanzie and Groton. He pointed out that if there is no apparatus in a town, it costs \$50 an hour to hire apparatus from another town; while if there is apparatus in the town, the other companies are bound to come for no charge."

This is now known as Mutual Aid!
Reports from the committees were heard.

1. Truck Committee: Mr. Max Bloom said that in his opinion, \$400 was the least that could be considered as the purchase price of a truck. Mr. Charles Dimmock, Sr. mentioned a 1938 Chevrolet truck for \$550. Mr. Calvin McCall suggested that it was first necessary to find out the weight of the pumping unit, tank, wet hose, etc. before settling on a truck.

With no money from the Town, only donations, they purchased the first truck – A 1938 Chevrolet with a wooden tank – for the newly organized Salem Volunteer Fire Company. The members used a small barn owned by the first Fire Chief Charles Dimmock, Sr. to keep the truck inside. The Smuckler Family donated a piece of property, approximately one acre on Rt 85/Hartford Road for the building of the fire station. The building was a 2-bay concrete block building, used to house one fire truck, while the other side of the building served as a meeting place.

In 1974 the need had grown for a bigger building so an addition was built to keep more fire apparatus and a meeting room large enough to hold fundraising dinners and dances. The size of the lot was not wide enough so the only way the addition could be built was to make the building longer. Because of that, the trucks had been driven in and backed out!

In 1989, the current facility was approved by taxpayers at a cost of \$335,000. The cost was kept down with, once

again, the volunteers doing most of the work. The Town supplied their dump trucks and payloader. Along with excavation and driveway equipment donated by Larry Getty and Everett Daniels. Morton Builders constructed the new building with 6 bays and a kitchen area, office spaces and a meeting room at the rear of the building. Upon completion of the current building, the Fire Company and the Town signed a 99-year lease for the property, the building and all the contents for the cost of \$1.00 payable on September 1st each year.

Through our many years of fundraising efforts which have included Ham and Bean Dinners, Turkey dinners, breakfasts, craft fairs, selling cookbooks, Salem monopoly games, grocery bags, car washes, dances, house number road signs, candles, BBQs, and our annual appeal, we have been able to help the Town by purchasing over \$120K of needed items without causing the taxpayers any additional tax burden. The Fire Company has also supported Town organizations throughout the years such as the Salem Youth League, Salem Seniors, Lions Clubs, and the Secret Santa program. Our largest purchase was the building in the rear of the current station in 2018 for \$50K with the Town putting in an additional \$45K. Without the generous donation of the parcel of land on which the garage stands from the Wlodarczyk family this building would not exist. The Wlodarczyk family has a long history of volunteering in our Fire Company and when the property was needed, they did not hesitate to help once again.

It's the men and women who walked through the doors that are the strength and longevity of our Volunteer Fire Company.

Garden Team Refurbishes the Salem School Gardens

After successfully restoring the garden by the track at Salem School, Joan Gaynor and her team set their sights on restoring the Court Yard Gardens in the back of the school.



After hearing of Joan's efforts and plans to clean and revive the Court Yard Gardens, fellow members Robin and Andy Pelletier told Joan about a memorial in the Garden dedicated to their son, Ethan, who had passed away. Joan found it and cleaned up the area around the marker so it could be seen again. Robin works for Sprigs and Twigs, a landscaping company, and they graciously offered to supply labor, plants, and materials totaling more than \$11,000 to help clean up and restore the Garden. On April 13, they removed the juniper shrubs, laid down straw, and returned in the summer to plant new shrubs and complete the refurbishment. The renovations on the Court Yard Gardens continued on July 31 when Sprigs and Twigs dug out weeds and overgrown grass and planted low-maintenance plantings to revitalize the Court Yard for years to come.
