"Teamwork" Another Fiscally Responsible Budget passed!

The Town of Salem continues to be in very strong financial health. Together, we passed another fiscally responsible budget. I want to commend our Board of Selectmen, our Board of Finance and our Finance Department for their hard work, collaboration, good fiscal management and teamwork. Our bond rating remains

upgraded, our rainy-day fund remains healthy and our town's finances are audited on a regular basis. Thank you to all who participated in the budget process and helped to keep our mill rate from increasing. We are already working on next year's budget.

Salem Public Safety

In order to improve and enhance public safety, our Board of Selectman, Board of Finance and our Resident State Police Troopers, Firefighters, Emergency Medical Technicians, Fire Marshals, and Emergency Management officials continue to collaborate, communicate and partner.

For more than two years, the town has hosted monthly Fire Chiefs' round table meetings at Town Hall where Chief Officers from our valued volunteer fire companies meet with our paid Fire Fighter / Emergency Medical Services Supervisor and town officials to de-conflict issues, plan, communicate, coordinate training, problem solve and conduct "lessons learned exercises" where they learn from past incidents.

We have retained Municipal Resources, Inc. to conduct a town-wide Public Safety Services Organizational Study and Analysis. This impartial analysis will provide the town with short-range, mid-range and long-range strategies, goals and professional assessments and recommendations to enhance public safety. It will also help us to use our limited available resources, staff and your taxpayer dollars in the most cost-effective and fiscally responsible way possible. The Board of Selectman will present the findings to the town.

GARDNER LAKE STATE PARK UPDATE - Ed Chmielewski, First Selectman

The Town of Salem is a beautiful place to live, work and visit. During the summer months, Salem doubles in size due to people visiting open spaces, campgrounds and parks. Trooper First Class Ben Duffy and Trooper Kevin Crosby are working hard to keep our townspeople safe.

Gardner Lake State Park is one of the most visited parks in the area and has been a hot spot for increased activity for years. The Salem Resident Troopers Office is aware of the increase in traffic and behavior in this park. As a result, they have been coordinating with the Connecticut Department of Energy and Environmental Protection (DEEP) and the Town of Salem to increase visibility, patrols and enforcement.

Gardner Lake State Park, like all State Parks, is policed by DEEP Environmental Conservation (EnCon) Police Officers. Some people may recognize their old title of "Game Warden." Traditionally the Connecticut EnCon Police Officer has been charged with the responsibility of enforcing the State's fish and game laws, but their role in law enforcement has expanded. Their duties now include the enforcement of the laws and regulations that concern boating, motor vehicle, criminal and public safety.

EnCon Police Officers serve as the primary police agency within our state parks and forests. Criminal activity of the same type that occurs in urban or residential areas also occurs within our state parks and forests. EnCon Officers are tasked to conduct patrol work within state parks and forests and act as a deterrent to such criminal activity. When crimes do occur in these areas, EnCon Police Officers are tasked with responding to the complaints and conducting investigations with the goal of apprehending those responsible for the criminal activity. within the State and Long Island Sound for recreational boating safety enforcement. EnCon Police Officers enforce state boating laws and regulations to ensure a safe and enjoyable boating experience for the many recreational boaters that



enjoy Connecticut waterways each year. To enhance the safety of boaters, EnCon Police Officers inspect boats for compliance with safety equipment requirements and check boat operators for compliance with boat operator certification requirements.

In addition to increased patrols, the Town worked closely with the Connecticut Department of Transportation to obtain the new "no-parking signs" that were installed along the front of the park on Old Colchester Road. These signs allow officers to ticket improperly parked vehicles and have helped with the traffic issue outside the park to some degree.

Unfortunately, like so many other Law Enforcement Agencies around the country, the Connecticut State Police and DEEP Law Enforcement are understaffed.

SALEM TREE TRIMMING INITIATIVE PUBLIC WORKS DEPARTMENT AND EVERSOURCE COLLABORATIVE

The Town of Salem Public Works Department is partnering with Eversource to remove trees and trim branches that could damage power lines. Incidents related to trees are a major cause of power outages during storms in Salem.

Work will include maintenance of tree trimming and pruning and, when necessary, extensive tree trimming or removal of trees that are decayed, insect-infested, or otherwise damaged or structurally weak and pose a danger to power lines.



Dear Salem Neighbors,

Eversource and town officials are working year-round to strengthen the grid through upgrades, maintenance, and proactive vegetation management. Connecticut's roadside forest is not only getting older, but it also continues to suffer the effects of environmental factors ranging from severe storms and recent droughts to a growing list of insect infestations and diseases. Trees are the number one cause of power outages and removing hazard trees that threaten overhead electric lines can improve reliability for the town, your home, and businesses.

The electricity that powers Salem originates from two locations: one in New London and the other in Colchester. This year, tree trimming is occurring along the power lines that lead to both power sources. In Salem, Eversource has hired two contractors, Asplundh and Lucas Tree, to carry out these tasks. Last year, Eversource removed more than 125 compromised or dead trees in Salem and Salem removed dozens more.

Eversource values its strong partnership with the town of Salem and is grateful for the support of the town's First Selectman Ed Chmielewski and Public Works Supervisor / Tree Warden Tony Gallicchio who work with our arborists to manage trees on town property. In addition, First Selectman Chmielewski has granted extra time for the cleanup of dead or hazardous trees on the opposite side of the road where our crews are working to reduce road closures and enhance public safety. This collaboration ensures an efficient and comprehensive approach to address any particularly challenging or hazardous tree identified in town.

Eversource also appreciates the relationship they have with the residents of Salem and has a long history of working closely with property owners to identify and mitigate hazard trees along power lines.

While trees cause the majority of outages, it is important to balance the need for electric reliability with the natural beauty that trees bring to Salem. Eversource Arborists Sabrina Steel-Ganacopolos and Susan Stotts have handed out 505 trees and shrubs to students and teachers at Salem Elementary School as part of an Arbor Day celebration. They strongly believe in planting the right tree in the right place. Residents interested in doing their own plantings can find a list of the 30 trees recommended under 30 feet tall on Eversource.com.

In addition to all the work crews do to minimize the effects of trees on reliable electric service, it is important for homeowners to know they are responsible for tree maintenance on their own property. This includes keeping branches away from the lower-voltage service wires connecting their homes and businesses to the main utility lines on the street. It is strongly recommended that residents contact a professional tree service company to perform this work if needed. THE FRIENDS OF THE SALEM LIBRARY SET PLANS FOR NEXT YEAR

On May 8, 2023, the Friends of the Salem Library held their annual meeting and approved plans and a budget for their next fiscal year. The budget includes \$15,000 of direct support to Salem Library for the collection, museum passes, and funds for Summer and Winter Reading, Storytime, and other programs. The budget also provides a \$5,000 one-time indirect funding for things like a de-humidifier for the basement of the old library, a large screen TV for behind the circulation desk, and aprons for the staff members working at the used book sale.

Revenue will come from our used book and plant sales, donations, and membership. If each family who partakes in a Friends-sponsored event would join the Friends for \$20, it would make our job a lot easier. Membership forms are available at the library and on the library website.

Leaving the Executive Board are two long-serving members, Martha Giegel, Secretary, and Carol Irwin, Membership Chair.

Thank you for your decades-long support of the Friends. Replacing Martha is Teri Natoli as our new Secretary and Jane Coffey as our new Membership Chair. Welcome to your new positions. Also at the meeting, Carl Nawrocki was elected to a two-year term as President.

We will be spending the summer collecting used books and sorting them for used book sales. Our next Used Book Sale will be held on August 19 & 20 in conjunction with the giant Lions Tag Sale.

TOWN CLERK UPDATE

Dear Fellow Townspeople,

Happy Summer! I hope you can enjoy the warmth, sunshine and relaxing days of summer.

The Town Clerk's office has applied for and we expect to receive soon another \$6,000 Historic Document Preservation Grant FY 2024. We will use this money to recreate the older Grantor and Grantee indexes which are needed due to the age and frequent use of the books over the years. We will also be able to recreate four of our older land record volumes. Additionally, for security in the event of a disaster, we will microfilm several thousand more pages of Board of Selectmen, Board of Finance, and Planning and Zoning minutes. These will be stored off-site. Should there be any remaining funds, we will purchase additional archival supplies. The work on these projects should begin later this summer and will take approximately 30-60 days to complete.

Wedding season is upon us. Congratulations to all those who have gotten married and those who are preparing for your wedding this summer. The Town Clerk's office has been very busy issuing licenses to happy couples.

The election season has begun with an endorsement of candidates by both parties due in July. Party chairs are always searching for people willing to serve our Town in either elected or appointed openings. You might just be the person our Town needs.

Hello from the Lions Club of Salem

Celebration of 50 years of service to the Salem community

The Club was formed early in 1973 through the singular efforts of Lion Joseph Raub from New London. One day he visited John Lecce's 354 Club, once a Salem tavern and restaurant. Upon learning that the Town's first Lions Club had ceased to be, suggested forming another one. With John's help, he enlisted the required 39 individuals to begin a new club and arranged for the Niantic Lions Club to be the sponsor. An application for a Club charter was completed on May 1st of that year, and the second Salem Lions Club was



recognized as organized on May 17th. The first official meeting, including Niantic Lions President Edwin McDonough and sixteen members of the Niantic Club, was held at John Lecce's establishment on June 27, 1973. Lion George Gillis was elected as the first President and the Club's mission of community service began.

Though part of the largest International service organization, the Salem Lions have, for the past fifty years, focused on serving the community of Salem (and having fun doing so). While funds for donations to worthy Lion-sponsored causes were raised by means of wood sales and raffles, tag sales, calendar sales, the Journey for Sight walkathon, Salem Road Race, dinner dances, hayrides, the sale of Super Bowl roses, and pancake breakfasts, most of the Club's energy was expended to address selected local needs. The service projects themselves were always primary.

On Sunday, May 7th the Salem Lions Club of Connecticut celebrated its 50 years of service to the town of Salem at a luncheon held at the Gardner Lake Volunteer Fire Department. The keynote speaker for the event was the Lions' Previous District Governor Mary Krogh. She discussed that the Lions Club's role in the community is to support and serve. They especially support charities, local needs, the visually impaired, diabetes, and cancer and are there when disasters occur, no matter where in the world. After her speech, State Senator Marks and Representative Cheeseman presented Salem Lions President Bill Martin with a
